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Dear Parent/Carer

Thank you for your patience and support during this last wee while – it really is very much appreciated.

The Scottish Government has now confirmed that all young people can return to school from the start of the new term, which for us in Aberdeenshire is Monday 19th April 2021. This date was set out within a broader framework for the gradual re-opening and easing of restrictions which are, of course, dependent on continued success in suppressing the virus. To that end, it is essential we do all we can to continue following the rules and adhering to FACTS as we go about our daily lives.

We have come a long way over the past year and the vaccination roll-out across the NHS Grampian area is making good progress, but the situation remains delicate. To that end, it is essential that we keep doing all we can to keep ourselves and each other safe. I know schools have been asking parents and carers to avoid gathering at the school gates at drop-off and pick-up times and I would ask you to continue to show your support as youngsters return to school next term.

Schools have reported very positive feedback to date on the phased return to face-to-face teaching and learning which commenced on 22nd February and I know staff have been pleased to have young people back in school buildings again.

The virus continues to circulate in society and as such there will be a continued need to be vigilant and there may well be times when individuals and indeed whole classes are asked to self-isolate as cases arise. We continue to work closely with and be guided by our colleagues in the Health Protection Team in NHS Grampian. While we will continue to ensure any identified close contacts receive communication from schools as well as directly by Test and Protect, it is no longer always essential to issue letters to whole-school communities. Our focus remains on prioritising health and safety within all establishments and public health colleagues have offered some very positive feedback about the substantial mitigating measures in place.

We will continue to do all that we can to keep schools open, using additional staffing where we have this available, and schools will keep parents and carers updated.

Lateral flow testing is available for all school staff who wish to undertake the tests and will be available to all S1-6 students in secondary schools from the beginning of the new term. Secondary schools will share specific details with learners with regards to these tests.

I know that you will be looking forward to the Easter holidays and I wanted to bring your attention to an update being shared by our Infrastructure Services team encouraging residents to act responsibly when enjoying our beautiful countryside: <https://online.aberdeenshire.gov.uk/apps/news/release.aspx?newsID=8122>
